ELIGIBILITY: Calculus I, MAC 2311 is a PREREQUISITE you must have a grade of C- or better in MAC 2311.

TEXT: There is no text to purchase (but you will need access to a Calculus textbook and a Precalculus textbook). There is no software to purchase (but you will need to download and install Scilab on your home computer). All biolab lessons are in on-line pdf files.

SOFTWARE: Scilab will be used in this course. Scilab is installed in 107 MCH and the following University Public Computer Labs: Oglesby Union (202 OGC), the Carothers Computer Lab (315 MCH) and the Strozier Library Basement Computer Lab. Lab hours are on-line at http://us.fsu.edu. We will also require you to download and install the free Scilab on your computer. There is also the free matlab clone Octive available for free download.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course is designed to introduce students to topics in computational and mathematical biology. Problems in biology, medicine and physiology are used to illustrate how computation and mathematics can improve and enhance their understanding. The purpose of the course is

- to improve the students's use of technology and computers
- \bullet to introduce students to topics in computational and mathematical biology
- to use techniques from Calculus 1 to analyze and solve problems in biology
- to introduce students to Scilab and similar software

ATTENDANCE: Attendance and class participation will be factors in determining the final grade. No food or drinks are allowed in the classroom. Please turn off cell phones and keep them hidden during class.

COMMUNICATION: It is your responsibility to register for a (free) FSU computer account so that I can send you email, which you are expected to check regularly. If you prefer to read your email elsewhere then you can arrange to have messages forwarded, but you must still obtain an FSU account in the first instance. This class does not use Blackboard.

GRADING: There is an on-line schedule of due dates using google calendar. There will be no tests and no final. Shortly before each lab, there will be an on-line prelab assignment due. The prelab is worth 30% of your grade. The bulk of your grade (60%) comes from in-lab problems that can only be done in 107 MCH. The score on a lab is reduced by 15% if you do not have a score of at least 40% on its prelab. The final 10% is based on attendance and participation. Some participation will require turning hard copy typed reports. (You must staple multiple page projects. Both dog-eared paper and paper clips will earn a grade of zero.) The 90%, 80%, 70%, 60% scales are used for A, B, C, and D; plus and minus grades may be given. (For example, a 92.5% grade might be an A minus.)

LATE WORK POLICY: Generally late work is not accepted. There are no excused absences from prelabs or the participation scores and at most one excused absence from the lab. An unexcused absence will be penalized. If an absence from the lab is excused, then the last lab grade will be used to replace the missing grade. Absences from labs due to family social events will not be excused. Acceptable medical excuses must state explicitly that the student should be excused from class. Since there are so many opportunites to complete a lab, any excuse must include all of them. Job conflicts will not be excused. The prelabs are available on-line, even if you are out of town. Every where is close to the internet.

COMPUTER ASSISTED INSTRUCTION: All prelab assignments are on-line by Thursday afternoon and are due by Monday 5 pm; every effort will be made to ensure these problems are always available this time period. However, the deadlines will not be changed, even if networks problems occur and the problems are not available. You get five attempts at the prelab, make sure you get at least one attempt several days before the due date. All computer labs most be done in room 107 MCH usually during the lab. Each lab is only available for one week. Students that don't finish the lab can (and are expected to) do so during one of the in-lab office hours for that week. There is no way to make-up a lab after Monday afternoon.
