### THE MACY FAMILY

Thomas MACY came to America from Chilmark, Wiltshire, England in 1639 when he was listed in the records as a freeman. He was at that time, undoubtedly already married to Sarah HOPCOTT, who also came from Chilmark. From the records we find that Sarah died in 1706 at the age of 94. Thomas's death is uncertain, but possibly in the vicinity of 1682. They settled in Newbury, then moved to Salisbury where he held several town offices, including Deputy to the General Court in 1652. When Salisbury was divided to form the new town of Amesbury, Macy and friend, Samuel Pease sought a division of the congregation and a pastor of their own choosing. That was not to be countenanced by the Church and they brought him before the Court. The punishment was to ostracize the family but not take away any of the 1000 acres he had been granted and purchased. That helped Macy make up his mind to sell out and move, but where?

The Macy family moved to Nantucket in the fall of 1659. Their first home was a very primitive hut, and, but for the kindness of the Indians, the family might have starved. The Indians brought from

their own supplies, smoked fish, berries and corn.

Probably the most famous of Thomas MACY's descendant's is the founder of the Macy Department Store in New York City. But, just because we are cousins of sorts, I don't think we can just go in and "charge".

At the Company meeting in Salisbury in 1661, Thomas Macy was made keeper of the records in Nantucket.

# SOME ITEMS ABOUT THE HISTORY OF NANTUCKET

Some miles off the southern coast of Cape Cod in Massachusetts lie two islands, The larger one is Martha's Vinyard, and fifteen miles to the East is Nantuckett.

When the Church of England started throwing its weight around and was harassing the people in New England, some of those harried were so upset that they decided to get away from that kind of treatment.

A group of nine decided to pool their money and purchase the island which was a part of a grant from the King of England to Thomas Mayhew. It would be easier to buy from a relative (cousin) than from a complete stranger, hus Tristram COFFIN and Edward STARBUCK went to Mayhew's home on Martha's Vinyard to talk about it. Then they took Peter FOLGER as interpreter to the Indians along with Mr. Mayhew on a tour of exploration and inspection. An agreement was reached for the group to purchase all rights to the propperty for the sum of 30 pounds. Later the Indians were also paid but not nearly that much. Oh yes, Mr. Mayhew also got two beaver hats, one for him and one for his wife.

The ten men were going to come up short of the total sum; so they went home and each took a partner to get the desired amount.

Each of these men got one share, with Mayhew keeping one for himself. When they finally moved to the island, they took with them everything they thought they would need for the first year or so. This included the type of self-governing they wanted. They were inexperienced, and found they had misjudged their needs; so they invited others with different abilities, to join them, but these new men were to get only a half-share each. That really threw an egg in the fan. This led to incriminations, down-right foods, and general discontent which was not completely settled for years. Each side petitioned the governor. The one in Massachusetts said it was not in his jurisdiction. The one in New York was being replaced. Finally the new New York governor decided that each man who bought into the island holdings hould get one vote on any business that came up before the entire group. This did not end the hard feelings entirely, but at least the Johnny-come-lately's were no longer considered second class citizens. .

## THE FOLGER FAMILY

Peter Folger was the only son of John and Meribah Gibbs Folger, who lived in Norwich, County of Norfolk, England. He was a widower when he salled to America in 1635. One the same ship was an indentured girl named Mary Morrill. Peter purchased the rest of her indenture for 20 pounds from Hugh Peters. He settled in Watertown, but about 1644 when Thomas Mayhew moved to Martha's Vinyard, as a married couple, they went with him. Soon Peter was teaching the Indians. When Coffin and Starbuck went exploring on Nantuckett in 1659 Peter went along as interpreter. Later just his presence was enough to nullify the Indians fears. The Folgers moved to the island in 1663.

Among his many descendents are Benjamin Franklin, Walter Folger, who in 1790 built a grandfather clock that told the second, minutes, and hours of the day, as well as the position of the sun, and the height of tides in Nantucket Harbor. This clock still stands in the Foulger Museum in Nantucket. Walter was an inventor, lawyer, teacher, historian and a representative in Washington 1817-1821. He taught himself higher mathamatics and medicine. During the war of 1812 he built for spinning and weaving to give the islanders clothing and employment during that war. And another who lent his name to coffee.

#### THE GARDNER FAMILY

In 1624 Thomas Gardner came to America with his wife, Margaret Fryer, from Sherborne, a community on the Salisbury Plains in England. He had been employed to oversee the fisheries. In 1626 he was one of the first settlers of Salem and a member of First Whurch. He was registered a Freeman in 1627, and was a Deputy that same year. Between then and 1668 he was Overseer of the Highways, and a member of the town Council.

His wife died about 1659, and he married again, to Damaris --- Shattuck, who had been a widow since 1641, of a Samuel? She died in 1674., the same year he did.

#### THE COFFIN FAMILY

TRISTRAM COFFIN could be considered an aristocrat. He was born on the ancestral acres, [given to the family by King Edward I for unstinted support] in 1605 or 1608 at Portledge, Brixton, Derbyshire, England. In 1642 there was civil war raging, and great tensions in the air. He probably felt that his lands might be confiscated, so he gave up the lands to distant family members and set sail for America. His wife, DIONIS STEVENS; his mother, Joanna (THEMBER) COFFIN; two sisters, Eunice and Mary; and five children accompanied him. They settled first in Salisbury, moved to Haverhill, then to Newbury and back to Salisbury. At some time they lived in Dover, now a part of New Hampshire.

Tristram's grandfather, Nicholas had died at Portledge in 1613; and his father, Peter, died in 1628, two years before Tristram and DIONIS were married. His mother, Joana THEMBER, 1584-1661, in Boston, could not have been left in England with no protectors. She diel 1660

COFFIN was the catalyst who drew together men of all stations in life, and persuaded them they could work together peacefully. It was not always exactly to his liking.

While living in Newbury, he kept an ordinary, sold wine, and their own homebrew which Dionis made especially heady and full, risking no fines. In 1677 Coffin was made Chief Magistrate on the island. By that time he had begun to give his estate to his children. who were:

# THE COLEMAN FAMILY

Thomas Coleman came from Wiltshire, England in November 1635, settlrf in Newbury. He had been evgaged by Richard Saltonstall and others "for the keeping of horses and sheep in a general place". The contract was not renewed. Probably one reason he was chosed to be a First Purchaser was that he had come from Wiltshire, the original hone of Tristram Coffin.

He is mentioned in Nantucket records in 1663, and in 1664 was

appointed one of the Surveyors of Highways.

Thomas's first wife was Susannah who died in 1650.

#### THE STARBUCK FAMILY

Edward Starbuck was born in Derbyshire, England in 1604 and came to America about 1635, with his wife Catherine Reynolds, a lady of Welsh decent. They settled in Dover. He was granted forty acres, then over the years purchased much more. He was active in town affairs, and held several town offices. He was an elder in the church. Then, about 1648 he was accused of becoming an Anabaptist, and was to be charged before the General Court. The resulting censure was very disquieting to a man of means, so when Tristram suggested he go with him to consider their removal to the island of Nantucket, he readily agreed.

Edward Starbuck was a man of commanding presence and was always ready to confer with the Indians to explain the various causes of the Indians alarm, and to prevent any hostile action.

# THE SWAIN FAMILY

Richard swain was about 34 when, in 1635 he came to America in the ship, "Truelove". He had sent his wifr, Elizabeth in the care of friends on another ship. Thry settled in Newbury. By 1539 he was at Hampton where he "had liberty to settle small claims". During the 20 years that Richard Swain lived at Hampton, he was made selectman, and commissioner for small causes.

With son John, he became one of the "First Purchasers.

In 1667 he deeded land to the guardians of the minor children of George Bunker, as he had married their mother.
